FACE, by nature, is an international NGO representing community of 7,000,000 hunters from national associations in 37 countries: Albania, Austria, Belgium, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary,

FACE contributes to the implementation of the Convention at the national level in various countries through our representatives and through our member organisations. Sometimes we hold events in the European Parliament with partners to promote UNESCO ICT. Where possible and desirable, FACE members have continued to collaborate with national cultural authorities in favour of the implementation of the Convention.

**B.2.** Describe your organization's participation in activities related to the **transmission** of **and education** for intangible cultural heritage. Explain, in particular, how your organization cooperates with communities, groups and, where relevant, individuals.

#### Not to exceed 250 words

We work with our members on promoting certain hunting-related cultural activities like falconry, certain breeds of hunting dogs, hunting horns, hunting dress, hunting culture, etc. on national UNESCO lists. This works involves external communications, meetings, events, shows, and other activities many of which are educational in nature involving a range of stakeholders. Another example of our work was our participation in the 'The Sharing the Knowledge' presentation series, organised by the IAF (International Association for Falconry and Conservation of Birds of Prey) Cultural Working Group. Emerging as a response to the challenges posed by the Coronavirus pandemic, the series offered a virtual space for falconers to connect, exchange knowledge, and engage in meaningful discussions at a time when in-person gatherings were largely unfeasible. FACE also worked together with IAF on aspects of the Welfare Course 2025 to strengthen the knowledge and the abilities of those who wish to start falconry, and which will also be useful for experienced falconers. The use of the articulate platform where the welfare course runs on for a cultural course in the future would be discussed under the MoU.

FACE has promoted various hunting practices as intangible cultural heritage prior to the existence of the UNESCO ICH convention. Representatives of FACE in our member associations organised numerous activities related to the safeguarding of certain hunting practices as cultural heritage and remain dedicated to managing cultural heritage activities (e.g. different hunting methods - such as stalking, calling, hunting with hounds, falconry, horn blowing, gastronomy, festive events, etc.). They regularly organise training (e.g. hunting courses, falconry, courses in taxidermy and the making of hunting artefacts) and events to keep the traditions alive. A part of showing hunting to the greater public is the organising of hunters' festivals. Hunting as an intangible cultural heritage is being described by FACE members in books and films and this is strongly promoted by FACE.

FACE has a close collaboration (IAF/FACE MoU) with the International Association for Falconry and Conservation of Birds of Prey (IAF), which was organising several events related to falconry. In this context, FACE joined IAF in a range of workshops to exchange of information, documentation and cooperation between communities and government bodies towards the promotion and preservation of falconry.

FACE's headquarters is in Brussels, where FACE builds the bridge between the Institutions of the European Union and the representatives of civil society. FACE regularly holds events in the European Parliament, provides opportunities for hunters and EU policy makers to meet directly,

participates in various official expert and advisory groups within the European Commission where EU policy proposals originate, and their implementation brought forward.

FACE is fully signed up to the EU Transparency Register which is operated by the European Parliament and the European Commission for the registration and monitoring of organisations and individuals engaged in EU policymaking and policy implementation.

FACE has a close collaboration (IAF/FACE MoU) with the International Association for Falconry and Conservation of Birds of Prey (IAF). Among other, we cooperate on policy issues at European and International level, such as relevant EU policy initiatives, CITES (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora) and IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature).

**B.5.** Describe your organization's participation in promoting the **role of intangible cultural heritage and its safeguarding in society**. Explain, in particular, how your organization cooperates with communities, groups and, where relevant, individuals.

FACE has dedicated a great deal of time over the past forty years to ensure greater recognition of and respect of hunting cultures as intangible cultural heritage. As a European NGO, we organise annual meetings for our members, every year in a different country, such as Poland (2022), Bulgaria (2023) and Spain (2024).

We also use social networks, our website, our publications, our journal, newsletter and other channels to aim concerned communities as well as general public. In many countries, our members support educational and training programmes within the communities and groups concerned and to people outside the hunting community.

Since much of European hunting culture cannot be learned from books, non-formal means of transmitting knowledge from generation to generation "from parent to child" are very close to the nature of the communities represented by our organisation. Since the main domain of hunting is knowledge and practice concerning nature, activities of our organisation inherently promote education for the protection of natural spaces.

We (including our Members) cooperate with a range of stakeholders in delivering our work.

FACE and its Members co-operate with universities, international conventions, other NGOs and with government departments, for example cultural and environmental, to promote work areas and projects relevant to cultural heritage.

FACE participates to the IAF Global World Falconry Day annually. The IAF encourages falconers from as many countries as possible to celebrate World Falconry Day (WFD) and to communicate the activities that they undertake for this to us so that we may inform UNESCO that the element of falconry is in fact, alive and is being practiced all around the world.

FACE is ensuring an active membership community to promote and safeguard specific hunting cultures across Europe. It regularly convenes the member associations in various working groups, which discuss how to communicate hunting practices, including falconry. It organises an annual general meeting to discuss matters of the Federation. It provides a platform for contacts between its members and European decision-makers, *inter alia* in the framework of the Intergroup "Biodiversity, Hunting, Countryside", which meets regularly in the European Parliament and for which FACE is providing the secretariat.

Under the FACE/IAF MoU, there is a strategic planning on considerations to support expanding the falconry submission to further countries which is one of IAFs next objectives for falconry as an ICH.

In certain countries, our organisation played a positive role in implementation and ratification of the ICH convention e.g. FACE support its Members in order to list falconry on its national UNESO list for ICH in conjunction with the IAF.

So far, FACE has not been directly involved yet in the drafting the reports. We are looking forward to opportunity to contribute to drafting the periodic reports in the next few years.

**B.10.** Describe your organization's participation in the preparation of nominations to the Urgent Safeguarding List or Representative List, requests for International Assistance or proposals of Good Safeguarding Practices.

Our organisation has supported the International Association for Falconry and Conservation of Birds of Prey (IAF) in the preparation of the nomination for the Representative List, encouraging State Parties, coordinating with concerned communities and related NGO on both national and international levels, leading to the successful submission of "Falconry, a living human heritage." This nomination was inscribed in 2010, extended in 2012, re-extended in 2016 (decision 11.COM 10.b.15), and once again in 2021 (decision 16.COM 8.b.14).

In 2012, the nomination was pioneering the extension procedure with two other States - Austria and Hungary. In this regard, ICH committee mentioned in its report (ITH/10/5.COM/CONF.202/6) that this is: "an outstanding example of co-operation between States and the exemplary quality of the information provided was underlined". So far, this file has been the largest multinational nomination in the ICH Convention history. High number of 18 States participated in this multinational nomination: Germany, Saudi Arabia, Austria, Belgium, United Arab Emirates, Spain, France, Hungary, Italy, Kazakhstan, Morocco, Mongolia, Pakistan, Portugal, Qatar, Syrian Arab Republic, Republic of Korea and Czechia.

So far, we have not been directly involved in cooperation with UNESCO, however, we have autonomously carried out and participated in a number of national and international activities and events towards ensuring ICH visibility, rising awareness, ensuring recognition of, respect for, and enhancement of the intangible cultural heritage in society and encouraging dialogue between related communities. We are supporting our members that promoted UNESCO-related activities/recognitions at national level.

FACE is a pan-European INGO currently representing related communities in 37 states having not only a professional staff, but also a number of voluntary experts among our members. A majority of our members demonstrate good English and French, some of them are native English or French speakers (such as the members in the UK, Ireland, France, Switzerland, Belgium and Luxembourg). We have also members and experts that speak natively other languages e.g. Spanish, German, Italian, and others. Concerning English, we have 2 native English speakers among the professional full-time staff in our secretariat in Brussels and 10 other staff members with near-native English level. 4 of our professional staff members have French as their mother tongue and further 4 master French at a professional level.

Yes, our organisation does have experience in working across several ICH domains, especially knowledge and practices concerning nature and the universe and festive events. We also have certain experience in social practices and oral traditions and expressions.

Our organisation has many dozens of experts among our members that have a scientific background and degree (professors, doctors) in the field of natural science as well as culture. Such people are able to analyse proposals or applications. So far, we have also analysed internally (for our own purposes) several ICH Representative List applications as well as national inventory list documents.

Yes, our organisation has experience in drafting synthetic text in English and French since these are both official working languages of our international organisation. Our organisation and members of our organisation produce various policy, legal and scientific papers, we publish our own newsletter and other communication in English and French, we prepare English and French PR materials for exhibitions and events, we prepare various legislation drafts and statements, we also prepare various materials and documents for international conventions and conferences other than UNESCO.
